This is a summary of how our school delivers music education to all our pupils across three areas – curriculum music, co-curricular provision and musical experiences – and what changes we are planning in future years. This information is to help pupils and parents or carers understand what our school offers and who we work with to support our pupils' music education.

Part A: Curriculum music

This is about what we teach in lesson time, how much time is spent teaching music and any music qualifications or awards that pupils can achieve.

On our website you will find our music curriculum plan for each year group plus the policy. Years 1- 6 have at least an hour of music a week and Early years have at least 15 minutes a week of adult led music as well as nursery rhymes and song time daily.

Our music curriculum was designed in conjunction with One Education music based on the Model music curriculum.

Children in year 3 learn to play the recorder through whole class teaching. Years 3 and 4 also have a half an hour of whole class singing tuition through the Salford diocese singing programme.

We have a strong partnership with One Education Music who provide our music tuition. We also attend their training and music co-ordinator network meetings.

Part B: Co-curricular music

This is about opportunities for pupils to sing and play music, outside of lesson time, including choirs, ensembles and bands, and how pupils can make progress in music beyond the core curriculum.

Outside of curriculum music we have a Polka dots music session for Early years and Key Stage 1. We also have an after school choir for Years 2-6. Children have accessed guitar tuition in small groups. None of our music extra-curricular clubs are charged for.

Local music centres and Saturday morning lessons are advertised to parents. WE have also engaged in the Young Sounds programme to engage disadvantaged pupils in music.

Part C: Musical experiences

This is about all the other musical events and opportunities that we organise, such as singing in assembly, concerts and shows, and trips to professional concerts.

Singing has a high profile in school. We have a weekly music assembly where children do warm ups and then practise hymns for masses. We sing regularly in church for masses, concerts and services. We also attend and perform in carol concerts in other parishes. Where possible we attend music events organised by One Education. We have also had Halle Meet a musician workshops come into school to show children that a career in music is something they can strive for. .
